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Introduction to PE and Sports Premium

Most schools with primary-age pupils receive the [PE and sports premium](#) in the academic year 2016 to 2017. Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in Years One to Six. Schools with 17 or more eligible pupils receive £8,000 and an additional payment of £5 per pupil.

Western Road Community Primary School receive £9005 for this financial year (2016 – 2017) which is paid in two instalments - £5253 (already received) and £3752 (paid in May 2017).

One of the conditions of this funding is that schools post a report about how it is being used on their websites.

How can the Sports Premium be used?

The government's advice is that schools must spend the funding to improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils but are free to choose the best way of using the money.

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PE and Sports Funding Spending at Western Road Community Primary School - 2016 - 2017

1. Participate in a wide range of sporting activities within the local community.	£1755	We will buy into the services of Priory School's sports coordinator, Sara Riley, who organises local tournaments, matches, performances etc. We will arrange cover as necessary to ensure the PE specialist teachers are available to attend tournaments and encourage sporting behaviours. We will also make contact with fellow members of the Trust to consider additional provision for pupils (cover may be needed to facilitate meetings and supervision for activities/tournaments).	Children took part in a wide range of inter-school tournaments and matches including netball, football, table tennis and athletics. The PE coordinator was able to attend those events to encourage sporting behaviours and also to inform school-wide planning for future participation. Participation in after school PE activities has risen. A sporting club is available each day after school, provided by Premier Sports, and these clubs are well-attended.
2. Support consistently high-quality PE teaching in line with the new National Curriculum.	£2800	We will buy into Linda Goode (Premier Sports) to help teach fitness and co-ordination lessons across the school. Each class teacher will observe lessons taught by Linda Goode (Premier Sports) to increase CPD PE knowledge and pedagogy across the school. The monitoring programme will include PE observations as part of the performance management cycle.	We have increased the range of resources available at lunchtimes and have Pupil Voice to inform choices of activities available on a rota basis each day. Learning observations and further Pupil Voice indicates that the children are engaged in and enjoying the additional activities offered.
3. Continue to offer high-quality swimming teaching in line with the National Curriculum.	£2500	We will buy into swimming lessons at Wave Leisure in Lewes to enable all children in Key Stage Two to have swimming lessons taught by dedicated swimming teachers.	We have evaluated the staff's CPD knowledge and confidence and all teaching staff reported in their responses that their confidence had increased by a significant amount. The specialist teaching has also developed the planning, delivery and assessment of PE. Children enjoy a range of PE activities – dance, gymnastics, athletics, invasion games and team games. Pupil Voice shows almost without exception that children enjoy PE and Games.
4. Develop an awareness of yoga skills to increase mindful learning.	£1950	We will buy into a specialist yoga teacher come in to teach yoga lessons in Years Three and Four. The relevant class teachers and teaching assistants will also participate in the yoga activities as part of their team building with the classes. The monitoring programme will include Pupil Voice as how to the children feel before and after yoga sessions and how their subsequent learning is affected.	All children in Key Stage Two have access to swimming lessons at Wave Leisure for two terms per year. This is in excess of the national requirements and ensures 97% of children leaving Year Six are able to swim at least 25m.
