There are two types of conjunctions: co-ordinating conjunctions, which are your FANBOYS - these help the sentence to have order, so connect the different clauses. The boy liked cabbage but he loved broccoli.

Subordinating conjunctions, which join subordinating clauses to the sentence to give additional information about something. Click the robot for a video on this.






What are adverbials?

Adverbials are words or phrases that give us more information about a verb - or event - in a sentence. Click the explorer for a video explaining it.

Conjunctions and adverbials in our writing add cohesion to our sentences.

Cohesion is like the glue that sticks the words together - it means that the sentence makes sense and sentences link together well. It is very important!
