Mr. Alison from Burleys (who manage Grange Gardens) came into school with blubs and bedding plants and showed us how to plant them in the raised bed outside our classroom. He also talked to us about designing flower beds and we had a go at designing our own. He may select one of our designs for a bed in the Grange next Spring. We are hoping to go to the Grange to plant bulbs there, as soon as the weather allows! We also had a lovely trip to Anne of Cleves House last week. Anne of Cleves house existed at the time of The Great Fire of London and we learned a lot about the materials the houses were built from why they caught fire so easily.



News from Larch Class

On Tuesday morning, we welcomed Grant Williams, a professional flint-knapper and archaeologist. He demonstrated the ancient art of making flint weapons and tools for survival and showed us how they would have been used in the daily lives of our prehistoric predecessors. We handled the artefacts and made detailed sketches of them. He taught us that our landscape, particularly in Sussex, is littered with prehistoric stone artefacts, each stone telling a story. These are often revealed in ploughed fields or even freshly dug rabbit burrows. So next time you're walking in the countryside, watch where you tread!
