London and other major cities began; this was known as The Blitz. Night after night (until May 1941), German bombers attacked cities, ports and industrial areas. Over one third of London was destroyed during this time. **Blitz** is the shortened form of the word **Blitzkreig**, which means lightning war.

- Air raid: an attack by enemy planes dropping bombs. Anderson Shelter: a small shelter constructed from corrugated steal, usually in people's gardens, to protect people Blackout: A wartime ban on streetlights and other lights at night, to reduce the risk of bombing by enemy planes. **Blitz:** A prolonged period of German air raids on Britain. From the German 'blitzkrieg' which means 'lightning war'. **Fascism:** A political system where the strength of the country is more important than the well-being of the people. Often ruled by dictators with unlimited power through suppression of any opposition and strict control of society. Fuhrer: German word meaning 'leader' or 'guide'. The title Hitler gave himself in 1934 when he gained absolute authority in Propaganda: Information, especially of a biased or misleading nature, used to promote a political cause or point of **Rationing:** Controlling the supply of food, clothes, petrol and other products to avoid or reduce shortages. Spitfire: A British aircraft, particularly used during the Battle of Britain and known for its speed and agility. **Treaty of Versailles:** The agreement that Germany signed when they surrendered at the end of World War II. Germany had to pay a significant sum of money and had to reduce the size of their army. Many people blamed the treaty for causing
 - During 1945 World War Two ended with the unconditional surrender of the Axis powers. On May 8th, Winston Churchill announced VE (Victory in **Europe**) Day and street parties were held to celebrate. It was 2nd September when **Japan** surrendered and the war was finally over - sadly Anne Frank had died just six months earlier.
