Schools may undertake domestic residential visits from 17 May. They will need to adhere to the COVID-19 guidance and regulations in place at that time. Annex C of the Schools coronavirus (CVID-19) operational guidance sets out the conditions that should be met when planning and undertaking a residential educational visit, including: • making make sure that there is adequate financial protection in place. • Bubbles being formed from existing school bubbles • Bubbles are circa 30 children which are consistent with the bubbles in school • Only teachers and members of the school workforce already part of the established school bubble should accompany pupils • Parents, carers or volunteers should not accompany the group unless a parent is needed for the safe inclusion of a child with medical needs. 2a - Pupils

- Work in partnership with local BAME and/or faith communities to reinforce individual and household risk reduction strategies relevant to the school community <u>PHE review of</u> the impact of Covid-19 on <u>BAME groups</u>
- Communication re hygiene measures recommended after school and pupils need clean clothes each day. Schools are encouraged to maintain their usual uniform policies
- Toilets will be cleaned regularly and pupils encouraged to clean their hands thoroughly.

vi) Schools should continue to offer wraparound provision, such as breakfast and after-school clubs, for those children eligible to attend school to help support the children of critical workers.

From 12 April, all parents may access wraparound and extra-curricular provision, without any restrictions on the reasons for which they may attend.

Schools may also continue to open up or hire out their premises for use by external wraparound childcare providers, such as afterschool or holiday clubs, that offer provision to children of critical workers and/ or vulnerable children. This includes for February half term for children of critical workers and/or vulnerable children. In doing so, schools should ensure they work with providers to consider how they can operate within their wider protective measures and should also have regard to any other relevant government guidance.

Refer to the relevant <u>guidance for</u> those who run community activities, holiday clubs, after-school clubs etc as much of this will be useful in planning extra-curricular provision.

Different groups being allocated their own toilet blocks could be considered but this is not a requirement if the site does not allow for it

2b - Staff

- Organise appropriately sized groups and encourage social distancing in line with the detailed <u>schools coronavirus</u> (COVID-19) operational quidance
- Maintain a review of timetables to identify activities that can take place outdoors and reduce movement around the school buildings
- PE lessons can continue in consistent groups

Providers should ensure they have a risk assessment in place outlining the protective measures in place for the activity. The venue should have a risk assessment for the environment. These measures should be accessible to parent/carers.

Where possible it is recommended that activities take place outside, where this is not possible inside spaces should be kept ventilated.

From 17 May, where wraparound and other extra-curricular activities for children are taking pace indoors, they can take place in groups of any number. However, it remains important to continue to minimise mixing between children where possible by keeping children in consistent groups when they attend the setting. Take into account the recommended occupancy levels of the premises you are operating from and levels of ventilation. Guidance for providers of grassroots sport and sport facilities recommends that the maximum occupancy of an indoor facility should be limited by providing a minimum of 100sqft per person. The guidance for providers who run community activities, holiday clubs, after-school clubs, tuition and other out-of-school provision for children may help you to plan extra-

curricular provision, including appropriate group sizes.

Parents should still not routinely be present. Where they do attend, you should consider the ability to maintain social distancing in line with the current guidance.

From 29 March, when all outdoor sports and supervised activities for children will be able to open without restrictions on attendance, activities taking place outdoors can happen in groups of any number. This is because the transmission risk is lower outside.

Early Years are not required to keep children in small consistent groups.

There is no requirement for anyone to wear a face covering during clubs, measures should be put in place if masks need to be removed on arrival.

Face Coverings

- Follow the <u>Schools coronavirus</u> (COVID-19) operational guidance and <u>Face coverings</u> in education guidance
- The recommendation continues to be that face coverings should be worn by staff and visitors in situations outside of classrooms where social distancing is not

and we will confirm in due course.

- Schools are able to work with external coaches, clubs and organisations for curricular and extracurricular activities where they are satisfied that it is safe to do so. Schools should consider carefully how such arrangements can operate within their wider protective measures.
- There are specifics about <u>swimming</u>, and <u>changing</u> <u>rooms</u>, hand sanitising and PPE
- Use of staff rooms should be minimised, although staff must still have a break of a reasonable length during the day
- plan how shared staff spaces are set up and used to help staff to distance from each other.
- Consider creating 2m zone in front of prep area in staff room. One member of staff at any one time in this area.
- Review risks assessments associated with wraparound provision and extracurricular activity as well as

- possible. Children in primary school do not need to wear a face covering.
- In secondary schools, face coverings are no longer recommended for pupils in classrooms or communal areas.
- Staff no longer need to wear masks in classrooms

A reintroduction of face coverings for pupils, students or staff may be advised for a temporary period in response to particular localised outbreaks, including variants of concern. If this happens, schools and colleges will need to communicate quickly and clearly to staff, parents, pupils and learners that the new arrangements require the use of face coverings in certain circumstances.

- Schools should have a small contingency supply available
- Schools should have a process for managing face coverings in school that is clearly communicated.
- Safe wearing of face coverings requires cleaning of hands before and after touching – including to

- non-overnight educational visits.
- Ongoing leadership support for any emerging anxiety and/or wellbeing issues
- Review the school's first aid risk assessment and follow HSE Guidance.

2c - Buildings & resources

- Classrooms and other learning environments organised to maintain space between seats and desks where possible.
- Systems in place to reduce congestion in corridors and access via external doors where possible e.g. oneway systems.
- Furniture arranged to allow for seating pupils side by side and facing forwards where possible.
- Unnecessary furniture moved out of classrooms to make more space
- Consider creating 2m teaching zones (where appropriate) at the front of the classroom.
- Halls, dining areas and internal and external sports

2a - Pupils

- The overarching principle to apply is reducing the number of contacts between pupils and staff. This can be achieved through keeping groups separate (in 'bubbles') and through maintaining distance between individuals.
- Review the NHS <u>guidance on</u> <u>hand cleaning</u> Staff **MUST** ensure that pupils engage in regular handwashing for 20 seconds with soap and water (or use sanitiser) at the following times:
- arrival to school
- returning from breaktime
- before & after eating
- when they change rooms
- Younger children supervised when washing hands and supervision also ensured where necessary when hand sanitiser is being used given risks around ingestion. Skin friendly skin cleaning wipes can be used as an alternative.
- Older pupils should be supported to maintain distance and understand not to touch

facilities used for lunch and exercise in line with latest guidance

Kitchens comply with the <u>guidance</u> <u>for food businesses on coronavirus</u> (COVID-19). They should be able to provide food to all pupils who want it, including FSM or universal infant free school meals. To balance the need for increased ventilation while maintaining a comfortable temperature, the measures outlined in 'Keeping occupied spaces well ventilated' in Part 7 of the <u>Schools coronavirus</u> (COVID-19) operational guidance should be used as appropriate to avoid build-up of viral load.

- Follow the specific HSE guidance on Air conditioning and ventilation during the coronavirus pandemic and Chartered Institute of Building Services Engineers' guidance on emerging from lockdown
- Ensure sufficient and proportionate handwashing supplies and cleaning materials are available.
 Where a sink is not nearby, provide hand sanitiser in classrooms and other learning environments
