Write in full sentences about: Who Shakespeare is. What plays he wrote. Why he wrote. The themes of his plays – what are they? What is the difference between them? Watch some of these clips for an idea of his play plots – The Tempest. https://www.bbc.co.uk/teach/class-clips-video/english-ks2-the-tempest-home/zfskxyc	Read through your work and check your capital letters and full stops.		
Wednesday	Work through one of the <i>Popping</i> <i>Punctuation</i> sheets – add the punctuation where it is needed.	WALT turn action into dialogue. Watch: https://www.literacyshed.com/partly-cloudy.html Mind map your ideas about what is happening, how they might be feeling and saying. Choose the part of the video you would like to focus on, with at least two characters. Decide what your focus will be. Look at the <i>Play Extract</i> again.	Use the play extract – look at the way it is laid out and copy this to write your dialogue between two characters. Example: Steve the Stalk: I couldn't deliver this beautiful bouncing baby – would you like it? Carli Cloud: What a delightful offer, however as you can see I'm having quite the issue getting rid of this crocodile; would you like it? (Crocodile pounces out of the cloud and starts nibbling Steve the Stalk's head. Steve the Stalk pulls at it frantically.) Steve the Stalk: Woah! Woah there! (He thows it back into the cloud) I would rather not.	. Perform your dialogue with someone in the house. See if you can make your vocabulary better with a theasurus.		

Thursday	Work through one of the <i>Popping</i> <i>Punctuation</i> sheets – add the punctuation where it is needed.	.WALT write stage directions. Watch: https://www.literacyshed.com/takingflight.html As you watch, write down what movements they are doing. What could stage directions be for? (So the actors know what to do).	Stage directions tell the actors what to do and are written in brackets () next to the character they apply to. They should be written in present tense (As if they are happening now). If it's a direction for everyone, they are written before the characters speak. E.g Boy: (Gets into the cart and looks up at grandad longingly.) Please? Grandad: (Smiles and walks to the cart).	Follow your stage directions to move and see if they make sense. Correct them as needed.
Friday	Work through one of the <i>Popping Punctuation</i> sheets – add the punctuation where it is needed.	WALT write a scene. Have a look at the Write a Play Script ideas — choose one to use. You can use a scene from your adventure story as a play, or about a part of the butterfly lion if you prefer - whatever you like. Mind map your ideas. What is the focus? Who are the characters? Where are they? What are they doing?	Write a play script scene, focussing on one event. Use the <i>Features of a play script</i> to guide to show you which features to include. You must include lines, character names and stage directions. Watch this first, if you are confused: https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/topics/zsn4h39/articles/zx8kng8	Edit your script for: Punctuation, spacing, interesting vocabulary (thesaurus).
