<u>Hedgehogs</u>

What do they look like?

Hedgehogs are small creature. Some can be as big as 1 foot long however others are much smaller. They are known for having lots of tiny spikes all over their backs. These are to help them with self defense. If they feel scared they will roll up in to a ball to protect themselves. They are usually a shade of brown, whote or black. They have very small features such as eyes, mouth and ears.

Where do they live?


Hedgehogs can be found in Europe, Asia, Africa and New Zealand. They can live in a wide range of habitats, including savannas, forests, deserts, scrublands and suburban gardens. Hedgehog homes are usually burrows and nests they build themselves. Hedgehog burrows can be up to 50 cm deep and are made from leaves, branches and other vegetation. Sometimes, hedgehogs take over burrows that other animals have left behind or nestle between rocks. They are nocturnal and sleep a LOT so their dark homes help them do this.

What do they eat?

They root underneath hedges and other vegetation, making snorting noises like a hog. During this activity, they find meals of fruit, fungi, centipedes, insects, snails, worms, mice, frogs, eggs, birds, frogs, reptiles, roots and snakes. Apparently hedgehogs can eat one-third of their body weights in just one night.
