Application and Reasoning Step 10: Using Paragraphs

National Curriculum Objectives:

English Year 3: Introduction to paragraphs as a way to group related material

Differentiation:

Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Reasoning)

Developing Sort 3 paragraph sub-headings into the correct order and explain the reasoning for that choice.

Expected Sort 4 paragraph sub-headings into the correct order and explain the reasoning for that choice.

Greater Depth Sort 5 paragraph sub-headings into the correct order and explain the reasoning for that choice.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Reasoning)

Developing Identify and explain the mistake made in a paragraph. Mistakes include: a single sentence instead of a group of sentences and sentences written in the incorrect order.

Expected Identify and explain the mistake made in a paragraph. Mistakes include: the use of inappropriate/irrelevant sub-headings and a change of context.

Greater Depth Identify and explain the mistake made in a paragraph. Mistakes include the format and break between two paragraphs.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Application)

Developing Determine where one paragraph should be split to make two separate paragraphs. Three sentences included, one with a clearly different topic or point. Expected Determine where one paragraph should be split to make two separate paragraphs. Four sentences included, two belonging together and two with a different topic or point.

Greater Depth Determine where one paragraph should be split to make two separate paragraphs. Five sentences included, where one has a subtle topic or point change.

Application and Reasoning Using Paragraphs

Developing

1a. Various answers, for example:
1. Breakfast; 2. Lunch; 3. Dinner
1 sorted the sub-headings this way because this is the order that you would normally eat the meals during the day.
2a. This is not a paragraph. It is a sentence. A paragraph is a group of sentences linked to the same topic.
3a. The paragraph should be split between the words 'pods.' and 'Threats'.

Expected

4a. Various answers, for example:

- 1. Introduction
- 2. Where do howler monkeys live?
- What do howler monkeys eat?
 Conclusion.

The introduction needs to come first and the conclusion needs to come last with the other headings in either order inbetween.

5a. The topic of the paragraph is Natasha's holiday to Florida. Natasha's favourite subject at school doesn't link to this topic so it should be in a different paragraph.

6a. The paragraph should be split between the words 'guards.' and 'The'.

Application and Reasoning Using Paragraphs

Developing

1b. Various answers, for example: 1. Ingredients; 2. Equipment; 3. Method I sorted the sub-headings in this order because the reader would have to know the ingredients and equipment that are needed before they can follow the method.

2b. The sentences are not written in the correct order so the paragraph does not make sense.

3b. The paragraph should be split between the words 'fire.' and 'The'.

Expected

4b. Various answers, for example:

- 1. Who was Neil Armstrong?
- 2. Neil's Childhood
- 3. Neil's Astronaut Career
- 4. Neil's Death.

'Who was Neil Armstrong?' should come first to introduce him and the rest should be placed in chronological order.

5b. The subheading is incorrect. The paragraph is about coffee so the subheading should be 'Coffee' instead of 'Tea'.

6b. The paragraph should be split between the words 'snapped?' and 'Dinner'.

Greater Depth

7a. Various answers, for example:

- 1. Introduction; 2. The First Flight
- 3. Air Travel Today; 4. Future Technology,

5. Conclusion. The introduction needs to come first, then the topics in chronological order with the conclusion being placed last.

8a. The sentences are separated. They need to be grouped together to create a paragraph.

9a. The paragraph should be split between the words 'park' and 'I'.

Application and Reasoning Using Paragraphs

Greater Depth

7b. Various answers, for example:

- 1. Contents and Equipment
- 2. Aim of the Game; 3. Setting Up

4. How to Play; 5. Winning the Game.

The 'Contents and Equipment' explain what is needed to play the game so it should come first. The 'Aim of the Game' will come next to explain the goal of the game. 'Setting Up' should then follow so that the players know how to prepare the game for play. 'How to Play' should come next so that the players know the rules and 'Winning the Game' will be ordered last. This is so that players know how to end the game.

8b. The information should be in two paragraphs. One paragraph should be about the stem, and a second paragraph should be about the leaves.

9b. The paragraph should be split between the words 'fur' and 'They'.
