
# WALT identify the purpose of my writing.

## Writing with a purpose - it's important! Click the image below to find out why.



Writing with a purpose helps us to know how to write - what tone and language to use, how to structure our writing, what should be included and what should not be included.

Why do you think the Ancient Egyptians wrote their stories that we now call Myths?

A Myth tells the story of how a natural phenomenon happened - for example, the birth of the Earth or the Afterlife.

These stories would have been written to share their beliefs with their civilisations and to pass important messages around about behaviour - for example, ensuring you were truthful so that you could get into the afterlife.

They would have thought carefully about their wording and the events in the stories, so that their audience (the people they were writing for) enjoyed and believed in the stories.

You therefore need to think about how you are writing for your purpose.



#### Example: how does the purpose change the writing?

The emerald green head of the careful crocodile swept up into the sky as his strong, human body followed, soon to crash down into the Nile's waters. No-one would dare to take more than they needed, now that he had appeared. Their greedy buckets slid behind their backs as they scattered, with only what they needed.

#### Example: how does the purpose change the writing?
