Forgotten what a pronoun is? Watch this video by clicking on it:



A pronoun is used to describe people, rather than using their name. They make it so that we do not need to repeat the nouns over and over again in a paragraph - the noun has been introduced, so we can then just refer to it by the pronoun.

(A noun is the name of a person, place or thing).

There are personal pronouns and relative pronouns.

A <u>personal pronoun</u> is a word which can be used instead of a person, place or thing. There are twelve personal pronouns for people: I, you, he, she, it, we, they, me, him, her, us and them.

A <u>relative pronoun</u> is a word which is used to refer back to nouns which have already been mentioned in the sentence.

Relative pronouns can describe people, things (including animals), places and ideas. They can also be used to join two parts of a complex sentence, using relative clauses. Examples are: that, whose, whom, which, where, when, that.
