About Our School

The working of our school

Western Road School is a single-form entry, catering for children aged 4 to 11. The school times are as follows:

8.40	School gate opens
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8.55 School starts

10.40 – 10.55 Morning break

12.05 – 13.05 Lunch

15.30 End of the day

All members of the school – staff, governors, parents, families and pupils – have an essential role to play in making our school safe and secure. Our pupils' welfare is our paramount concern and the school's Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy and Procedures are available for parents and carers on our school website.

Facilities

We have dedicated Key Stage One and Two playgrounds with large play equipment to encourage the development of gross motor skills as well as opportunities for collaborative and imaginative play. We also share the large field with Southover School so that the children are able to practise a range of physical and creative activities on a larger scale.

The EYFS has a dedicated classroom and additional outside space to allow free-flow throughout the day. The Year One and Year Two classrooms also open directly onto the Infant Playground.

The School Hall includes a large stage, perfect for performances such as the EYFS and Key Stage One Nativity and Year Six end of year performances. Recent plays have included 'The Tempest', 'Bugsy Malone', 'Romeo and Juliet', 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory', 'Hairspray' and 'We Will Rock You'.

School Partnerships

Parents are involved in the school as governors, as members of Friends of Western Road and the Parents' Forum. The Forum meets every term with the Headteacher and discusses recent successes or concerns that have been raised by the school community. Children are also consulted about the running of the school via the elected School Council.

Many of our children go on to Priory School in Lewes and in 2014 we became, with Priory, a founding member of the Lewes Cooperative Learning Partnership. An excellent transition programme ensures children are well prepared for the next phase of their education when they leave Western Road at the end of Year Six. Ofsted (July 2016) stated 'Significantly more pupils than seen nationally reach at least the expected levels by the end of Year Six in reading, writing and mathematics....this ensures that pupils are well prepared for their secondary education.'

School Curriculum

We support a creative cross-curricular approach to learning with ambitious goals for children's achievement. This is delivered through consistent, high quality teaching and a broad and engaging curriculum with plenty of opportunities to demonstrate learning in a variety of ways. Children are encouraged to challenge themselves and develop resilience, self-confidence and a love of learning.

English

English is integral to every aspect of the curriculum. We aim to help children become fluent, independent readers, confident speakers and attentive listeners. Creative units of work are carefully planned around key, quality texts. Children begin writing in the Reception class and learn how to write for a variety of audiences as they progress through the school. Phonics is taught from the outset, focusing on the skills needed to help reading and spelling; in Key Stage Two more formal spelling patterns are taught and investigated.

Maths

We ensure children develop a love of mathematics and gain a broad view of the subject and its applications. Children undertake practical investigations, learning concepts using concrete resources and understanding concepts with familiar numbers in-line with a mastery style of teaching and learning. Children are taught to use reason and known facts

to help work out unknown facts, rather than learning by rote methods alone. These are then developed further using pictorial or abstract methods including mental and written strategies for calculating and problem-solving.

Science

Our science programme encourages the children to develop observational skills, make hypotheses and draw conclusions through a range of practical and experimental activities. Exploring, questioning, investigating and evaluating are important skills and links are made to maths as well as other areas of the curriculum.

Computing

We have access to computers in every classroom enabling a full Information and Communications Technology programme to be followed. Computing is taught through a cross-curricular approach in addition to teaching discrete skill lessons. Word-processing, Scratch and Espresso feature in the syllabus as well as discussing e-safety with children of all ages. All classrooms feature electronic whiteboards to make lessons more interactive and facilitate the use of a range of stimulating resources.

RSHE

Our RSHE curriculum develops an understanding of a safe, healthy lifestyle. It provides opportunities for children to explore feelings and build positive relationships with others. The curriculum aims to prepare children for life, helping them to value who they are and how they relate to other people in the world.

Design and Technology

Technology involves design and practical construction using a variety of materials in a project-based setting. Children are encouraged to be creative and practical in their outlook and to make informal evaluations and reflections of their end-products.

History and Geography

The children are encouraged towards a greater understanding of their environment, both local and global. They learn about important events from the past and how these have shaped our society. The Humanities programme is delivered through project-based learning and is underpinned by a range of enriching educational visits.

<u>Art</u>

We encourage the use of a variety of media allowing children to develop their creative skills through the acquisition of techniques and an appreciation of the aesthetic qualities found in nature and well-known works of art. A broad range of famous artists are studied throughout the school.

All classes sing, compose and create music through our whole-school music programme. Children in Years Three and Four have the opportunity to learn to play the ukulele. All

children take part in weekly singing assemblies and many children in Key Stage Two participate in our school choir which practises after school each week and has performed locally at the 'Big Sing' Festival, in collaboration with Glyndebourne and at 'Voice In A Million' in Wembley.

Physical Education

Our PE programme includes gymnastics, dance, athletics, outdoor adventure, swimming and ball games. We value healthy competition, being a good sport, cooperation, perseverance, fairness, as well as developing relevant skills and techniques allowing all children to progress and experience success. We also value the role of health and fitness in maintaining our wellbeing and supporting our mental health. All children will have the opportunity to take part in yoga sessions and the Daily Mile.

Religious Education

Learning Support

The school emphasises the importance of quality first teaching, underpinned by robust planning, taking into account the differing needs of pupils in each class. From time to time some pupils require additional and different provision. In such cases, the school's special educational needs co-ordinator (SENCo) will liaise with the class teacher to ensure appropriate support is in place. This may involve outside agencies and parents are consulted at every stage of the process. Ofsted (July 2016) commented 'Teachers and teaching assistants work well together to support pupils' differing needs.'

Homework

Homework is set weekly in Years One to Six. Children are encouraged to read each day, to learn weekly spellings and complete a Maths task. They may also be set an additional writing activity. Homework is designed to complement classwork and to help children to develop independent learning skills.

Assessment and Reporting to Parents

Children take National Tests in Years Two and Six. In addition to this, teachers assess progress each term in key curriculum areas. Children's progress is shared with parents at Parents' Evenings and through the mid-year and end-of-year written reports. Appointments can be made to discuss progress with staff at any time in the year.

Community Support

We welcome parental help in the classroom and on school visits. All volunteers are required to have recent DBS clearance and the Headteacher's agreement before working with the children. If you have a particular expertise which you would like to share with the school, please do let us know.

Communication

The school sends home a fortnightly newsletter which includes up-to-date information about school events and key dates. This is also emailed to parents. Our website is updated regularly and is another source of important information www.westernroad.e-sussex.sch.uk Parents are welcome to contact teachers via the School Office and staff are usually available at the end of the day for brief conversations (longer appointments may need to be arranged in advance).

Behaviour

We have high expectations of behaviour for all members of our school community. These expectations are described in our Behaviour Policy and our Staff Code of Conduct Policy.

It is our belief that children will only achieve their full potential in an environment of mutual trust and respect, where they feel safe, secure and valued. Staff work hard to nurture positive, affirming relationships with our children.

Medicines

Where medicines have been prescribed, the School Administrator may administer medicine to children with written permission from parents. All medicines are kept by the School Administrator in the School Office.

Absences

High attendance is a key factor in the success of children at school as it has a positive effect on their relationships and safety. If your child is absent through illness, please inform the school as early as possible on the day of absence. We are required by law to monitor every absence. It is expected that family holidays will be arranged during the school holidays.
